Minutes of Regular Meeting February 7, 2022

The City Council of Jefferson City, Tennessee, met in regular session on Monday, February 7, 2022 at 5:00 p.m., at City Hall, with Mayor Mitch Cain presiding.

The Opening Prayer and Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mayor Cain.

Roll call by the City Recorder was as follows:

Also present were John Johnson, City Manager; Robert Burts, City Attorney; and Monica Myers, City Recorder.

Upon motion of Councilman Melton, seconded by Councilwoman Combs, the minutes of January 3 and January 18, 2022 were unanimously approved as written.

Upon request by Mayor Cain for citizen comments, there were none.

In communications from the Mayor, he announced the Jefferson County Chamber of Commerce Banquet would be held March 10 at the Lakeway Christian Academy in White Pine, and he would reserve a table for City Council. New City Banners for Hwy. 11-E and Hwy. 92 would be up shortly. The local sales tax was up by 10% for December, which means people were shopping locally. He presented two worksheets from the Jefferson County Finance Department showing Hotel/Motel tax collections and contributions to the Jefferson County Chamber. He also stated he will be meeting with the County Mayor and the other City Mayors to discuss economic development.

In reports from Committees, Council Members, and other Officers, the following reports were presented to City Council: Fire Department Monthly Report, Police Department/City Court Monthly Report, Parks and Recreation Monthly Report, Public Works/Utilities Monthly Report and the City Manager's Monthly Report.

City Manager John Johnson told City Council that he had recently attended a LAMPTO meeting and that the intersection improvements on Chucky Pike (Hardee's Restaurant Side) would not be ready until the end of the year.

Upon motion of Vice Mayor Bunch, seconded by Councilman Melton, Bryan Miller and Betty Churchman were unanimously reappointed to the Adjustment & Appeals Board.

Mayor Cain announced his reappointment of Carolyn Blevins and Elizabeth Moser to the Beautification Board, Stephanie Fleming appointment to fill the unexpired term of Mary Gombert, and appointing Mary Gombert to serve on the Beautification Advisory Board.

Upon motion of Vice Mayor Bunch, seconded by Councilman Melton, Kevin Davenport was unanimously reappointed to the Jefferson County Equalization Board.

Mayor Cain announced his reappointment of Spencer Gatlin to the Planning Commission.

Upon motion of Councilwoman Purkey, seconded by Councilwoman Combs, Ordinance 2022-01, an ordinance of the City of Jefferson City amending the operating budget for the Fiscal Year 2021-22, was unanimously adopted on first reading.

Upon motion of Vice Mayor Bunch, seconded by Councilman Melton, Resolution 2022-06, a resolution authorizing the extension of the trash contract with Waste Connections of Tennessee, Inc. and conversion to 95-gallon carts provided by Waste Connections, was unanimously adopted.

Upon motion of Vice Mayor Bunch, seconded by Councilwoman Combs, Resolution 2022-07, a resolution authorizing the purchase of a replacement police K-9 for the Jefferson City Police Department, was unanimously adopted.

Upon motion of Councilwoman Combs, seconded by Councilman Melton, Resolution 2022-08, a resolution authorizing the payment of pro-rated county taxes on the Jerry Brewer property on Main Street and waiving of city taxes on the same property, was unanimously adopted.

Upon motion of Vice Mayor Bunch, seconded by Councilman Melton, Resolution 2022-09, a resolution authorizing the status of the Administrative/Accounting Clerk be changed from part-time employee to full-time employee, was unanimously adopted.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:23 p.m.

ACCEPTANCE AS CONTRACT

Upon acceptance by Owner this proposal shall set forth the terms and provisions a valid and enforceable contract between RoofChoice and Owner, which shall be interpreted and construed exclusively in accordance with the laws of the State of Tennessee. Such contract represents the entire and integrated agreement between RoofChoice and Owner and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, either written or oral. No amendment of any provision of such contract shall be valid unless in writing and signed by both parties. In the event that any clause or provision shall be held to be invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the invalidity of such clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions. Should either party fail to perform as provided herein, the non-defaulting party shall be entitled to recover damages resulting from such default. In the event either party must take legal action to enforce its rights, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the other party, who hereby agrees to pay, all the costs of such action including reasonable attorneys' fees.
